We are making a few changes to our newsletter process and one of them is starting a lot earlier. I am writing this in March the week before the school break and before the annual invasion of our grandchildren. Winter started late and we lost most of our snow early although we will probably get a major snowstorm in late spring just because I said it. We did suffer through some bitterly cold extended periods of time. The snow mobile season was far too short according to most sledders.

There is some serious discussion going on about the use of ATVs on municipal roads and trails in Haliburton. Their annual sales are growing steadily and their economic impact is significant to our area, but they are, by design, off-road vehicles. Dysart has serious concerns about the municipalities' liability if they are allowed on municipal roads.

The Asian Long-horned Beetle is causing serious worry and concern in the Greater Toronto Area. The number of trees that had to be destroyed is alarming. I don't know what action we can take as individual cottage owners. Try this Website for Q&A:

We continue to be advised that the best prevention for slowing the spread of Zebra Mussels into our lake system is to thoroughly clean our boats and motors when moving them between lakes and in particular when using them in the Trent system.

A special thanks for the "heads-up" from Terry Maher about new "fish stocking in new waters in the Ministry of Natural Resources Minden Area, Bancroft District." Leeyann Tomasini, leeyann.tomasini@mnr.gov.on.ca. MNR Minden Area Office advises that MNR will be stocking under their Put-Grow-And-Take program Brook Trout into Kennis Lake. Please contact her directly for any further information.

I am advised that Dysart is optimistic about holding the line on our taxes this year in spite of a continuation of growing assessment values on lake front properties.

We continue to explore the use of Land Trusts and other

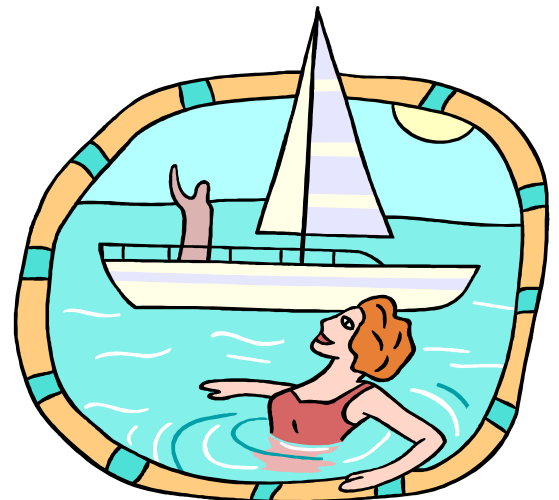

THE STATUS OF THE 911 PROJECT IN 2004



The 911 Project is an enormous undertaking that has been on-going day in and day out since June, 2001. If there is to be a successful launch of the service this year, we need the assistance of individual property owners, tenants and any organizations that represent them. To understand the nature of that support, consider each of the following points.

Road Naming – We are aware that some road groups are dissatisfied with the name given to their individual roads and that they intend to approach the municipality seeking a name change. To proceed with 911 implementation now, there must be stability in naming. After the start-up, citizens are welcome to raise the issue of road naming with the municipality.

Address, Telephone Number and Property Identification Confirmation – In the months ahead, a letter will go out to the tax billing address of each property owner seeking confirmation of your civic (911) address, your telephone number(s) and the assessment roll number for the property printed on your tax bill. If all are correct, then just sit tight. Otherwise, you must contact us requesting the correction of our information or a sign installation.

No Address Sign – Putting up 911 signage is still underway in the municipalities of Minden Hills and Dysart et al. Until we notify you that we think installation is done, either by a notice in the local papers, community radio (CANOE 100.9 FM) or by e-

mail to association representatives, please do not contact us. It just distracts us from other important duties. Furthermore, we much prefer that one person contact us on behalf of all residents on a given road wherever possible.

Signage Removal – In the past, many Cottage Associations set up and installed their own individual property numbering. To eliminate the possibility of confusion for emergency responders, all the old numbers must be taken down. The same applies to signs for road names that are no longer in use. We will inform you of the deadline by which this should be done.

Water Access – Addressing water access properties is more difficult and time-consuming because it is impossible to drive our trucks around the rim of an island or along a shoreline where there is no road. For now, we will associate such properties with the address of the shore point where an emergency response boat would be launched to provide service at your location. More information as to how you might assist us in this endeavor will be provided to the associations in the months ahead.

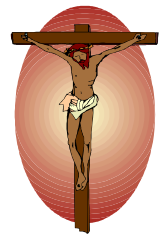
Gated Roads – If the gate across a road was closed and locked at the time we did our addressing in 2002, then the residents on that road are not included in our 911 coverage. Contact us as soon as possible to make arrangements for us to get access so that we can undertake field work and sign installation starting in late May.

911 Launch Date – In January, 2001, we estimated that we could have everything ready so that 911 coverage would commence on July 1, 2004. Despite our best efforts, we will not be ready by that date. No alternate date can be announced until Bell Canada gives us one, though our expectation is that it will be sometime later in the summer.

In Memoriam...

Over the winter, we also lost two more long-time KLCOA members: Cal Moffat and Betty Hammond. They will be remembered as good neighbours and friendly cottagers around the lake.

Lake Steward's Report

There's lots to report on, so I'll keep it brief and save details for May meeting.

KLCOA Land Holdings A recommendation regarding the final resting place for the KLCOA's land holdings (wilderness area on South shore, Lipsy Bay, and two "Blueberry islands" near dam) will be presented in May. Presently, we have title to the wilderness area, while the Municipality is temporarily holding the other properties until we make our decision. Our objectives are two-fold:

1. Ensure the long term protection of the natural and recreational values of these properties
2. Limit or better yet eliminate any tax payable by KLCOA on the lands

The creation of a Haliburton Land Trust is currently underway and making steady progress towards becoming operational. It appears that we have 3 basic options other than KLCOA having usual title to all lands (and having usual tax liabilities).

1. Turn lands over to the Haliburton Land Trust, if/when it becomes operational and demonstrates capacity and stability to ensure protection of the lands. We would still have some tax liability
2. Acquire title to lands but take out a "Conservation Easement" with the Haliburton Land Trust, Municipality, or County.

3. Negotiate an arrangement with the Municipality (more on this at May meeting)

Lake Character Planning This concept was raised at the Fall 2003 meeting as something the Association would investigate. A Lake Character Plan and the related planning process

- identifies the special character of the lake
- consolidates information about the past and current state of the lake
- provides land use direction for development and redevelopment
- educates lake community members
- promotes consensus on issues and concerns

Mr. Randy French of French Planning Services (www.frenchplanning.com) has been tentatively booked for the May meeting to explain this process. In March he prepared a proposal for the development of a Kennisis Lake Plan that will be presented for consideration at this meeting. The benefits of the process appear considerable, but to keep costs down and to maximize buy-in of cottagers and

other users, it will be necessary to marshal considerable volunteer effort from within the membership.

Tree Planting Lipsy Bay Soil was placed on the road/rock embankment in Lipsy bay 1st Saturday of last October by approximately 20 volunteers. It was a very successful (and hot and back-breaking) day, and a decent bed for planting should be awaiting us this spring (soil was stabilized with geocloth). We will be planting the trees **Saturday May 8th**. **We need volunteers** – please contact me. We'll be meeting on the road at Lipsy Bay at 9:00 AM, and will likely be working until lunch or shortly thereafter. Lunch will be provided, but I need to know how many to order. Many thanks to the great effort of volunteers in October, and great to have some new West Shore participating!

Environmentally Friendly Products Great to see the store carrying environmentally-friendly Nature Clean products last summer. I was not able to confirm whether new store managers will carry them this year, but please ask for them either way. Haliburton Forest cookhouse carries Shaklee products that work very well.

Water Testing As of this spring, we're re-engaging in the Ministry of Environment's "Lake Partner Program" (see <http://www.ene.gov.on.ca/programs/3731c.pdf>) where regular water sampling will take place several times per year at several sites on big and little lake. Testing is primarily for phosphorus, and does not include biological/bacterial contaminants. I will be looking for volunteers to help regularly collect and submit samples – please contact me. I want to get all past info and future test results on website. I'll have full details at May meeting.

Cottager on Trial The south shore cottager who built the concrete float plane "pull out" (roughly a large dock) without permits did not reach an out-of-court settlement with the Department of Fisheries, and as such will be on trial in Lindsay June 5th. DFO is asking for complete removal and \$10,000 fine. LESSON: Check with DFO or MNR before planning any permanent dock work! DFO Peterborough: (705) 750-4012 MNR Minden: (705) 286-1521

- The 2002 Regatta monies were never deposited at the request of Keith Rodd, in order to make disbursement simpler. Thus in order to reconcile to the bank statements, these transactions must be discounted.
- The Charge back for FOCA 2001 must be discounted in order to reconcile to the bank statements.

Investments:

Details to be provided later. However, one GIC matures in August and we need to decide if we wish to keep it as a Flex GIC or go for a high yielding locked in GIC

Properties:

I do not actively track or manage the value of the 3 lots held by the association at this time; they're just listed.

Did you know???

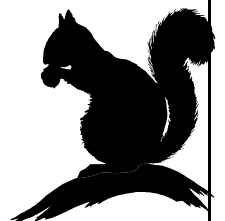
Apparently, black squirrels are on the move!

Previously confined to Southern Ontario, they have been spotted all over the Canadian Shield, east of Sudbury and north of Kingston, in recent years.

A Kennisis Lake cottager, Shirley Turchet, wrote to Cottage Life Magazine about having spotted one of these cute little fuzz balls on one of our islands, and the March 2004 issue ran her letter on p. 26 under the "Cottage Q&A" feature.

In her response, Jo Currie noted that it seems climate change may have enticed the black squirrels to move north, and that since squirrels have excellent eyesight as a rule, they will actually swim from the mainland to the islands if they think there is a chance for them to find food there.

They're apparently pretty good swimmers, so don't be surprised if you see a squirrel racing between the shore and the nearest island—being in the open water leaves them quite vulnerable to birds of prey, so they make their crossing as fast as they can!



Haliburton's Public Library Open to All

Public library services are provided to the residents of the County of Haliburton. You can find information on your local branch by calling the Administrative Centre at 705-457-2241 or by using our website at www.libris.ca/hali/. Our website provides you with an on-line catalogue and access information for all of the branches. You can also place InterLibrary Loans or reserve material; you will be called by the local branch when your request has been completed.

Fees

In accordance with the terms of the Public Libraries Act, there is a fee for some library services. If you not a property owner in the county, the annual membership charge is only \$20.00 per family, or \$ 8.00 per quarter.

Internet Access

All branches have Internet access through the CAP project for email and some have separate facilities for library research only. Computers are available to the public when the branch is open but to be assured access, it is wise to reserve a time in advance, particularly during the summer. You must be a member of the library to make use of Internet facilities; there is a modest charge.

Programmes

More and more branches are featuring both story time and story circles amongst other programmes. Contact your local branch by telephone for complete information; their number is in the Yellow Pages.

Want to help?

To keep up in the quickly changing library world, we need your help. Story circles are becoming very popular in all of the branches. Ask the local staff how you can participate. It isn't very time consuming and all children love it!

Donate a magazine subscription to a branch. County staff can advise you on what titles would be the most useful to users and everyone benefits. Or remember a loved one by selecting a book donation from our wish list! Bookplates will be inserted in the titles selected.
